On August 3rd, grab a watermelon and enjoy this amazing big berry!



crepuscular, meaning they are most active during dusk and dawn. There are no rabbits native to Antarctica.

I love rabbits because they are so cute! A female rabbit is called a doe and a male rabbit is called a buck, just like deer. The dwarf rabbit is the smallest rabbit in the world with a height of 5-6 inches while the flemish giant rabbit is the biggest rabbit in the world with a height of 30 inches. When rabbits are happy they do a little dance called a binky, where they jump high in the air and do a half-twist. Several of the traits of the rabbit are similar to that of a horse. Like cats, rabbits can clean themselves through the day by licking their fur and paws. Rabbits can jump very high, and there are rabbit jumping competitions where rabbit owners can show off their rabbit's agility.

The Woods are Lovely, Dark and Deep

with Joe and Jason

Wood! It's all around us in the form of trees, houses, furniture, ships, the side paneling on certain old cars (lower bottom photo), and so much more. We use and interact with wood every day; sometimes it has very little commercial value - like a popsicle stick, or a pallet (lower middle photo) you might find discarded behind a grocery store.

Sometimes a few pieces of the right wood in the right hands can come together in the right way to create something of profound personal and historical significance -such is the case with our friend Jake's guitar (top photo below). Joe's guitar, for example, decreases in value as he dings and scratches it, while Jake's grows in value simply because he owns it. It all depends on who's doing what with the wood!







One of the best things about wood is its versatility. It can be carved into any shape, it can be glued, nailed, or locked together using the ancient art of joinery. It can be broken down into sawdust to create compost or a firestarter, or polished and shellacked until it looks like fine brass. It can be steamed and bent, routed and inlaid, whittled and sanded, or roughly chopped up to heat a home.


It was the versatility of wood that spoke to Jason and me when we were discussing how we should make the new picture frames for Enterprise's walls. The current frames are great - flat, easy to clean, and made of simple components - but we felt it was time for something new and different. We're still only in the testing phase, but we're pretty happy with the results!

(Left) A *woodie*, or *woodie wagon*, is a classic station wagon style featuring a wood-bodied or wood-paneled design.

But I Have Promises to Keep

The step-by-step process went as follows:

1. **Collect the tools.** We decided we needed a saw, a mitre box, a triangle, a drill, some drill bits, and a hammer, so Joe brought those from home.




- 2. **Collect the materials.** We went to the hardware store and picked up some screws, nails, wood glue, and a piece of wood that's 8' long and $\frac{3}{4}$ " x $\frac{3}{4}$ " wide.
- 3. **Cut the wood.** We used the saw and mitre box to create a wooden rectangle that's 8.5° x 10". For the first frame we tried cutting all the corners at 45° so the sides of the frame would meet in a way that's pleasing to the eye.
- 4. **Glue and nail.** We glued two sides together and let it sit for about an hour. After the glue was dry and the joint was solid we drilled a pilot hole for a screw. The pilot hole went in without a hitch, but the screw still split the wood. Back to the drawing board. We then tried the same glue joint and pilot hole approach, but this time we hammered in a small nail instead of a screw, which did the trick. When all four sides were glued and nailed we had a nice little prototype frame! (right)






And Miles to go Before I Sleep


This frame looks great. All it needs is a little sanding and stain/sealant and it'll be ready for the wall. The problem is that the 45° cuts are somewhat imprecise using the mitre box. Another way to make this frame would be to cut the wood straight and join it at 90°. It might not look quite as nice, but we needed to consider the realities of large-scale production. We'll need 50+ picture frames for Enterprise, so speed and cost should definitely be considered.








And Miles to go Before I Sleep

That tells us that the wood was probably not totally straight when we bought it, which caused this misalignment. Now we know that we'll need some straight wood and a jig (something to put the frames in as we assemble them to ensure all four sides are square) moving forward. We're getting there!

Then we picked out some epic sandwiches from our class for Sandwich Month! We forgot how many sandwiches there are... But we didn't stop at sandwiches—we made cookies, bacon and eggs, butter, sushi, popsicles and all manner of ice cream, pie and cake, and cheesecake, to name a few. 
Our current book art project is painting bricks to look like books. We think they'll look great under and around our LFL, tucked amongst the plants in the yard. We picked out books we've read in Literary Circle, making sure to choose some that were particularly colorful, as well as some impressive ones so we could show off! Our selection: *The Great Gatsby* and *To Kill a Mockingbird* (which get extra credit for being banned books) *The Egypt Game*, *Hatchet*, *The Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy*, *From the Mixed-Up Files of Mrs. Basil E. Frankweiler*, *Out of My Mind*, *Hurricane Season*, and *The Wild Robot*.

First step was brick acquisition, and we got our steps in wandering every single aisle of Lowe's to find them. Then we hosed them off on the patio, and hung out to watch them dry before applying base coats of cover colors. Next up, we painted the brick edges white for the paper pages. Now for the hard part: cover art! Our strategy is to start with the simplest ones–*The Great Gatsby*, which is mostly just eyes, and *Hatchet*, which is pretty much just a hatchet. And our philosophy is that if any of them turn out ugly, we can hide them underneath/inbetween/behind those that turn out better! And as Bob Ross would say, there are no mistakes in art, just happy little accidents.

"What is THAT?" asked Tess when she saw this picture (above).

"It's my favorite animal," said Darnell, "it's an axolotl."

The *axolotl* (pronounced ACK-so-lot-ul) isn't your average salamander. The axolotl is native to Mexico's Xochimilco lake system. They have a childlike appearance (probably due to their larval nature) and with some remarkable abilities.

Forever Young

In a typical amphibian life cycle, such as that of a frog, growing up involves drastic changes – from an egg to a tadpole, and then to a fully developed frog.



Unlike most salamanders, which undergo metamorphosis to become land-dwelling adults, axolotls bypass traditional metamorphosis. They hatch from their eggs into a larval form, akin to tadpoles, but instead of transitioning to a terrestrial form, they remain and reproduce in their larval state. Genetically, axolotls lack certain thyroid hormones that are crucial for triggering metamorphosis in other amphibians. So axolotls retain their aquatic, gilled larval



form throughout their lives. This phenomenon is called *neoteny*, essentially meaning they stay in a perpetual juvenile stage. This youthful look is complete with feathery external gills, a long fin running down their back, and a perpetually wide grin (which is not really a smile, but certainly looks like one!).

Regenerate like Wolverine!

One of the axolotl's most incredible superpowers is its ability to regenerate. They can regrow lost limbs, tails, even parts of their heart and brain! What??? Scientists are still unraveling the secrets behind this amazing feat, but it holds great promise for future medical advancements.

Axolotls: The Smiling Salamander

By studying axolotls, maybe scientists will unlock secrets to regeneration so that we too will be able to regrow body parts like comic book superhero Wolverine!

Breathing Underwater

Axolotls are primarily aquatic breathers (they breath underwater like fish), using their feathery gills to extract oxygen from the water. However, they also possess a hidden talent – the ability to breathe air too!

When oxygen levels in the water are low, axolotls can develop rudimentary lungs and breathe directly from the air surface. Axolotls are quite adaptable!



The axolotl's distinctive appearance has captured imaginations for centuries. In Aztec mythology, the god Xolotl (below) is often shown in the form of a dog or a dog-headed human, was associated with fire, lightning, and...[wait for it...] axolotls! Like the Egyptian god Anubis and the Greek ferryman Charon, Xolotl was a *psychopomp* in Aztec mythology. Psychopomps guide souls of the dead on their journey to the underworld.









Axolotis are Endangered

The amazing axolotl is critically endangered in their natural habitat due to water pollution, invasive species, and habitat loss. However, axolotls are also popular aquarium pets, and captive breeding programs are underway to ensure their survival.

By studying and protecting these remarkable salamanders, we can unlock the secrets of regeneration and preserve a piece of Aztec mythology for future generations. More axolotl facts here: https://axolotlexpert.com/life-cycle-of-an-axolotl/

Louis Armstrong: The King of Jazz

Louis Armstrong was an exceptional musician. People called him "Satchmo." He was born in New Orleans on August 4, 1901 and died in 1971. When Louis was young, he learned to play a shiny, brass instrument called a *cornet* while in a juvenile detention center.

Louis was amazing at playing the cornet. He made a kind of music called jazz. Louis could make his cornet sound like it was singing! Louis could also sing really well.

Armstrong was more than just a great musician. He was a kind person who wanted everyone to be treated fairly. So Armstrong used his platform to advocate for civil rights (Civil rights guarantee equal social opportunities and equal protection under the law, regardless of race, religion, or other personal characteristics), and his music became a universal language, bridging racial and cultural divides. Armstrong's songs like "What a Wonderful World" and "Hello, Dolly!" cemented his status as a global superstar.

Louis Armstrong's legacy continues and his music is a timeless treasure that continues to connect with audiences all over the world. Even though Louis lived a long time ago, people still love his music today!



Macaroni & Cheese

Macaroni & Cheese/Facts & Talking Points

*Macaroni & cheese has been around for CENTURIES. That's hundreds of years. The 1st recorded recipe is from the 14th century in a famous Medieval English cookbook. It was a cheese and pasta casserole known as makesouns, and it called for layered hand-cut pasta between a mixture of melted cheese and butter.

*Thank You for the Mac 'N Cheese Thomas Jefferson! Our third president Thomas Jefferson first brought macaroni and cheese to the United States. Before he was president (and before the United States was the United States) Jefferson served as the Ambassador to France, where he tasted pasta and cheese. And he came back and said, "You GUYS. Have GOT to try this!" He built a pasta cutting machine and imported dried pasta and parmesan cheese to the US from France. In 1802, he served "A Pie Called Macaroni" at a state dinner.

*The Blue Box When we think macaroni and cheese, a lot of us probably think of the boxed version. Kraft introduced its boxed version in 1937 in the middle of the Great Depression. It's slogan was "Make a Meal for Four in Nine Minutes". It was a huge hit, and an immediate success in the US and Canada. In the first year alone, they sold 9 million boxes! Today they sell over one million boxes A DAY! That's a lot of mac n' cheese. It Fueled America in Wartime. During WWII Americans could get two boxes for one food ration stamp.

*Oh, Canada! Kraft Dinner, or KD for short, is considered the national dish of Canada. It is the single most purchased grocery item in the country. And apparently they eat it with ketchup. (Please vote. Thumbs up or thumbs down?)

*Broken Record The record for eating an entire box of Kraft macaroni and cheese is 1 minute 2.14 seconds. Yikes. The largest pot of macaroni and cheese on record is 2,469 POUNDS. And speaking of lots of mac 'n cheese: Costco introduced a ginormous bucket of it weighing 27 pounds, with 180 servings for \$89.99 and it SOLD OUT immediately.

*Shape it Up Since developing the first non-elbow shaped pasta in 1975 (which was a spiral) Kraft has come out with over 2,000 different shapes, including trains, dinosaurs, and unicorns. The most popular shape ever sold is Spongebob Square Pants.
