December is a Time for Meteor Showers

What is a meteor?

A meteor is any piece of comet, meteoroid, or asteroid that travels into Earth's atmosphere. When they enter Earth's atmosphere, they burn up and light up the sky!

December brings two meteor showers: *the Geminids* and *the Ursids*. The Geminids (around December 13–14) are one of the brightest and most reliable meteor showers of the year. If you





look up at the night sky in a dark area, you might see "shooting stars"!

December Holidays

Bodhi Day (Dec. 8)

Also known as Rohatsu, this Buddhist tradition honors the day in which the Buddha— Siddartha Gautauma—is said to have achieved enlightenment. Many Buddhists celebrate it through meditation.

Feast Day of Our Lady Guadalupe (Dec. 12)

Mexicans and Mexican-Americans often celebrate the feast day of Our Lady of Guadalupe, the patron saint of Mexico who symbolizes patriotism and devotion.

Yule (Dec. 21)

Yule comes up on December 21, on the winter solstice. It is the shortest day and longest night of the year. Apart from the marking of a new season, the winter solstice also holds a significant symbol for the Sun. It

appears to stand still on this day, it's believed that the Sun is going through a rebirth.

The Story Behind Friday the 13th

Why Fridays?

What's Happening at the Project Center?

KUNG FU CINEMA

Happy winter!

Daniel and Joe have been spending a lot of time learning about kung fu cinema history. There's a lot to learn, and a lot of history! From its beginning in Hong Kong with films like *Come Drink With Me*, to modern iterations like the IP Man franchise, martial arts films have been a cultural phenomenon for nearly sixty years. Kung fu cinema began in Hong Kong

as a backlash against Wuxia - a fantasy genre that usually took place in ancient China. Wuxia was originally live theatrical entertainment, but was parlayed into a film genre in 1928. It used cheap special effects and fantasy cliches, which opened the door for kung fu. There were some films, like 1983's *Duel to the Death* that combined kung fu and Wuxia, However, according to Hong Kong film director, producer, and movie writer Ronny Yu, Wuxia movies are not to be confused with martial arts movies.

Here are some excerpts from our Kung Fu Cinema class!

- The earliest kung fu film was called *The Adventures of Fong Sai-yuk* (1938). There are no surviving copies of the film.
- Wong Fei-hung was an early kung fu cinema hero and master of the Hung Gar fighting style. He started a martial arts school in Shuijiao in 1863, and also worked as a physician during that time. Wong has been portrayed over 100 times in film and television.



- Kung fu's greatest actor was Bruce Lee. Lee broke Chinese conventions by training outsiders in his style of kung fu Jeet Kune Do. He is credited with promoting Hong Kong action cinema and helping to change the way Chinese people were presented in American films.
- Some of Bruce Lee's best known films are: *The Big Boss* (1971), *Fists of Fury* (1972), *The Way of the Dragon* (1972), and *Enter the Dragon* (1973).

What's Happening at the Project Center? KUNG FUCINEMA with Daniel and Joe

Martial arts films have been produced all over the world, but the genre has been dominated by Hong Kong action cinema, peaking from 1971 with the rise of Bruce Lee - until the mid-1990s when the industry began to decline. The genre was revived close to the 2000s. Other modern

notable figures in the genre include Jackie Chan, Jet Li, Sammo Hung, Yuen Biao, Tony Jaa, Donnie Yen, and Hwang Jang-lee.

- Modern martial arts movies are still being made today all over the world. Jean Claude Van Damme's movies *Bloodsport* and *Kickboxer* are some modern examples of the genre's continued development.
- The most famous female kung fu practitioner was Ng Mui. is said to have been one of the legendary Five Elders/survivors of the destruction of the Shaolin Temple by the Qing Dynasty. According to legend she is said to have been a master of various martial arts including the Shaolin martial arts, the Wudang martial arts, Ng Ying Kung Fu and Yuejiaquan, and the family style of Yue Fei. She is also credited as the founder of the martial arts Wǔ Méi Pài (Ng Mui style), Wing Chun, Dragon style, and Five-Pattern Hung Kuen.
- Wing Chun is a style of close quarters combat. The origins of Wing Chun are uncertain, but it is generally attributed to the development of Southern Chinese martial arts. There are at least eight lineages, of which the Ip Man and Yuen Kay-shan lineages are the most prolific. Bruce Lee learned Wing Chun as a teenager and incorporated it into his personal fighting style.

- Do you have a favorite martial arts movie? (Daniel's is *Enter the Dragon*, and Joe's is *Crouching Tiger Hidden Dragon*)





Christmas Around the World

Mexico: Las Posadas

In Mexico, Christmas celebrations often include a nine-day event called Las Posadas, which means "The Inns." This tradition reenacts Mary and Joseph's search for a place to stay before Jesus was born. People go house-to-house, singing songs and carrying candles, until they are welcomed into a home for a big celebration with food, piñatas, and music.



Sweden: The Yule Goat

Australia: Christmas on the Beach

But why does it happen, and what are some songs that most people can't seem to forget?

Why Do Earworms Happen?

Songs that get stuck in our heads usually have some things in common, like a simple, catchy melody, repetition, so the brain remembers it more easily, and surprising or interesting lyrics.


