We Visited Some Petaluma Historic Parks

It was too nice to stay inside, so Mike, Phoebe, Tyrone, Bert, and Joe decided to head up to Petaluma to check out some historic parks.

Wickersham Park

First stop was Wickersham Park. Though it's small and bathroomless, the park has many beautiful rose bushes scattered around its grounds, and an abundance of benches from which to enjoy them. The park is named for Issac Wickersham, who opened the first bank in Sonoma County. (Right) The gang poses in front of a beautiful tree in full bloom.

Walnut Park

It wasn't until we got back to Novato that we discovered Walnut Park's rich history. First constructed in the 1880s, the park has been home to many farmers' markets, concerts, and squirrels over the years. Cavanagh Landing Park

A pair of fussy geese were the first to greet us at the Cavanagh Landing park. They hissed and advanced on us, but ultimately let us pass without incident. The park is located at Petaluma Turning Basin, which is a part of the Petaluma River. Long docks run along the edge of the basin, and stairways drop down here and there to take you up to the street level. We didn't see any fish, but we did snap a good group photo (below).

The Amazing Armadillo

The Nine-Banded Armadillo is the official state animal of Texas, nicknamed the "Hillbilly Speed bump", as they are hit on the roads so often. The name *Armadillo* is Spanish for "Little Armored one," a name given by Spanish conquistadors in Latin America.



The diet of an Armadillo consists of beetles, ants, termites, insects, plants and fruit.





Armadillos have very strong legs with claws for digging. Armadillos have hard shells to protect themselves from predators and other dangers. They have between 1-15 babies at a time.

Only one species of Armadillo can roll into a ball to defend against predators. That species is called the "La Plata Three-Banded Armadillo." The other Armadillo species simply dig a hole quickly and hunker down so that their stomach is protected and their armor is the only thing visible.
