

Bruce's Bee Knowledge Class





Bruce has had as many as six bee hives operating on his property in Point Reyes. He brought in an old bee box, some honeycomb, and beeswax to show us, and we are looking forward to taste-testing some bee pollen! Here are some facts we learned about bees:

- 50,000 bees can live in a single hive
- Most bees in a hive are female-those are the worker bees. Male bees are called drones
- The queen bee is much bigger than the worker bees. She can lay 2500 eggs a day. It takes an egg only 21 days to be a working adult
- One bee can visit between 50 and 100 flowers per day
- Bees have 5 eyes! They can see all colors except red
- Bees communicate by doing a little dance-they can tell each other when and where they've found a good source of pollen
- Bee boxes have empty frames inside, like vertical drawers, for bees to build their honeycombs in. When it's time to harvest the honey, you pull the frames out and use a heated electric knife to cut out the combs. They get put into a centrifuge, either electric or hand-cranked, that spins it and throws the honey out against the wall, then down into a container with a spigot for dispensing.





Bruce's Bee Knowledge Class More Facts with Jennifer

- Honey tastes different depending on the type of flowers the bees used to make it. Eucalyptus honey has a hint of menthol flavor. Orange blossom honey tastes floral and citrusy. Blueberry or blackberry honey will have a fruity flavor
- Honey is the only food in the world that can't spoil.
 Honey was discovered in King Tut's tomb that was
 3,000 years old, and it was still edible!
- Bees fly as fast as 15 miles per hour. Their wings flap
 200 times per second-that's faster than hummingbirds

In the town of Sebastopol, just past the fire station, not far from Ives Park, sits an unassuming little thoroughfare named Florence Avenue. It's short - only about three blocks long - but it contains some of the most outrageous pop art Bert, Joe, Mike, Phoebe, and Tyrone have ever seen!

The metal sculptures that dot the public spaces of Sebastopol are the work of local artists Patrick Amiot and his wife Bridgitte Laurent. He constructs 'em, she paints 'em. The couple moved to Sebastopol in 1997, and began putting the sculptures up in their yard as a way to encourage community interaction. On their website Patrick writes:

"The whole purpose of my work is to glorify these objects, because they have their own spirit," Amiot enthuses. "When a hubcap has traveled on a truck for millions of miles, and has seen the prairies in the winter and the hot summer asphalt, when it's done traveling with that truck and finds itself in the scrap yard and I find it, I kind of like to use that. This hubcap, or whatever piece of metal, from the day it was manufactured until now, has an important history. And I like to think the spirit of all these things lived incredible lives. If they could talk to you, they could tell amazing

stories. That's something I don't want to hide."

Andrew's Corner

Spider-Man

Spider-Man is one of the most beloved and iconic superheroes of all time. Spider-Man first appeared in Amazing Fantasy issue number 15, which was released August 1962. That makes your friendly neighborhood Spider-Man 61 years old! He was the first teen superhero to work on his ownbefore then, teenagers had strictly been sidekicks to adults.



Spider-Man was created by Stan Lee and Steve Ditko. (You might recognize Stan Lee from his many cameo appearances in Marvel movies.) The head of Marvel Comics at the time disapproved of Spider-Man's concept because of people's fear of spiders. In fact, Stan Lee originally considered basing the comic hero on a fly or another insect before settling on Spider-Man.

It is Spider-Man, not Spiderman or Spider Man–Stan Lee specifically placed a hyphen between Spider and Man to avoid confusion with another superhero: Superman! Spider-Man's real name is Peter Parker. He got his powers from being bitten by a radioactive spider. Spider-Man's powers include superhuman strength, speed, and reflexes, superhuman durability and healing powers, "Spider-Sense" alert, heightened senses, as well as wall-crawling and web slinging.

Spider-Man's love interests are Black Cat, Gwen Stacy and Mary Jane Watson. Some of Spider-Man's enemies include Venom, Doctor Octopus and the Green Goblin. Spider-Man has appeared in over a dozen movies! There has even been a Spider-Man musical. It was called "Spider-Man: Turn Off the Dark" with music and lyrics by U2's Bono and The Edge. It ran from 2011 to 2014, and was the most expensive musical in Broadway history, with a running cost of over \$1 million per week.

The Spider-Man balloon floats in the Macy's Thanksgiving Day parade measures 78 feet long by 36 feet wide, weighs 400 pounds, and takes 90 balloon "handlers" to walk the parade route.

The most famous quote from the Spider-Man series is "with great power comes great responsibility."

Creature Tails





Disc Golf

In honor of National Disc Golf Day, the first Saturday in August, Zachary, Aiden, Andrew, Nino and I headed off to Pioneer Park to meet my husband, Zayd, a diehard disc golf player and super fan of the sport. We got the opportunity to interview Zayd about the sport and we got some handson coaching too. This is what we learned from our interview:



Zachary: What is disc golf?

Zayd: Disc golf is a sport similar to ball golf, but instead of hitting golfballs into a hole with a golf club, you throw discs to an above-ground target - like the basket I brought.

Andrew: How long does an average game take to play? **Zayd**: It takes up to 4 hours for an 18- hole game depending on how many people are playing.

Nino: How long have you been playing disc golf? **Zayd**: I've played the game for 25 years with my friends.

Aiden: Can anyone learn how to play?

Zayd: It's easy to learn to play. As long as you can throw a

frisbee, you can learn to play the game.

Aiden: Why do people have to focus when playing disc golf?

Zayd: Focusing helps you throw better. So just think about how you will throw the disc in the basket.

Nino: How many discs do you need to play?

Zayd: You only really need three discs- a putter, a mid and a driver to play. I carry about 24 discs in my bags when playing to have a variety to throw.

Michelle: How many discs do you have?

Zayd: Ummmm, about 100 discs.

Zayd: The Bay Area has a lot of courses such as Stafford Lake in Novato, Taylor Mountain in Santa Rosa, Hans Park in Vallejo, and one in Tilden Park. But you can practice just about anywhere if you have a basket. Like the one I brought for us to use today.

After our questions were answered, we got to try it for ourselves. First, Zayd showed us how to grip the disc, then how to throw. After a few tries, everyone got the hang of it and we think we did pretty well for first-timers! Andrew made one basket, Aiden made two, Zachary made three and Nino made a whopping six baskets. There is nothing more exciting than hearing the chains on the basket clink when making a basket! It was a fun, fun day!





8/14 is World Lizard Day

So what exactly is and what is not a lizard? Lizards are part of a group of animals known as reptiles and they are most closely related to snakes. No surprise there. We did find some surprising lizard facts:

- Some lizards, called *sheltopusiks*, look like snakes because they have no legs!
- Unlike snakes, most lizards have moveable eyelids. Creepers!
- There are currently over 4,675 lizard species, including iguanas, chameleons, geckos, Gila monsters, monitors, and skinks.
- Lizards smell stuff with their tongues! A lizard sticks out its tongue to catch scent particles in the air and then pulls back its tongue and places those particles on the roof of its mouth, where there are special sensory cells. The lizard can use these scent "clues" to find food or a mate or to detect enemies. Wouldn't it be cool if we could do that? "That doesn't taste like a enemy, but..."

Let's celebrate World Lizard Day and acknowledge that lizards are weird and wonderful creatures!
