

Listen Up: Staff Training with Chas

Skilled Listening

We can't always just fix people, but if we try, we can always listen to them, and oftentimes, that is a lot, if not all, of what they need. During staff training, Chas talked about ways and styles of effective listening. So let's look at a few of them:

Active Listening (also called empathic listening) - Make it a point not to judge, correct, debate, counsel, expose, embarrass, bore, ignore, or punish. Just simply be all there for the person, and receive, appreciate, and <u>validate the emotional intent of the person's message</u>.



Listening is always all about trust. Once someone trusts that you are really listening and once someone feels really "listened to," he is much more likely to listen back... making possible a dialogue that is respectful, reciprocal, and real!

Now we're talking! In many cases, it may be useful to take Active Listening a next step further. It is called **Productive Listening** and it is defined simply as Active Listening with a product. As the person talks, you collaborate to get that message down on paper. This could (and should) be "quality time" wherein "quality attention" is exchanged, a positive ritual by which the person recognizes his own eloquent voice to be "on the record!" This is part of what we do when each student at CH&S writes in his / her Project Journal at the end of each day. It's a script to live by.

Chas also touched upon:

- Actionable Listening... listen for action plans, ways to follow up
- Informational Listening... listen to gain or improve understanding
- Reflective Listening... repeat or rephrase what you hear to check for understanding
- Persuasive Listening... listening receptively to enhance negotiation
- Critical Listening... listening analytically in collaboration to facilitate decisionmaking

Staff Training: How to Listen

Things avoid

- Selective Listening... Just listening for what you want or expect to hear
- Defensive Listening... taking things that you hear as personal attacks, threats, or insults
- Delusional Listening... listening that is premised upon cognitive distortion
- Litigious Listening... competitive, listening to win





A few tips

- Be a *listening presence*. Give undivided attention.
- Listen beyond just what is said. How is it said? What is meant? What is felt?
- Listen to behavior. Listen to body language.
- Take things personably, not personally.
- Ask clear, constructive, compelling questions.
- Be patient. Allow for silence.
- Don't judge.
- Respect!
- Care!

Everyone is different... and yet, everyone is the same. We all, in one way, shape, or form, must be heard. Getting to know someone is, in large part, learning to listen to them... Learn to listen and listen to learn.

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Daniel's Gameplay



GAME GAUNTLET

Daniel's dream career is reviewing video games, he's been working on a logo/avatar (left) and he's thinking of calling his review blog *The Game Gauntlet*. Here's Daniel's first review:

The First Berserker: Khazan is a *Soulslike* (meaning it features difficult, skill-based combat, interconnected levels, and a focus on exploration) action role playing game. The object of the game is to collect loot by fighting various tough enemies. To win the game, the player must survive a series of missions and defeat the final boss.

In addition to being a Soulslike game, it also reminds me of a hack and slash. A hack and slash is a game that primarily uses melee, (close range) weapons. The long range weapon that the player can wield in The First Berserker is soul ball that can be thrown like a projectile in sneak attacks. For example, when I was fighting an abominable snowman-style ape, he threw rocks at me. The player's only option in this situation is to block or evade, both of which deplete the player's stamina. A well placed, strong attack from an enemy can deplete your health bar completely and you start back from your last bonfire checkpoint.

Graphics

The art is done in an anime* style, and it specifically reminds me of a series called Berserk. There's a lot of blood in the game, and the takedowns are very visceral and brutal. The graphics are very bright, and the backgrounds are extremely detailed.

Story

The game tells the story of a general named Khazan who is framed for crimes he didn't commit. His friend, a warrior brother in arms, has been executed by corrupt royal officials. Khazan is possessed by a demon warrior spirit who helps him on his quest for revenge against those who wronged him.

Pros

- There is an option to change the difficulty from easy to normal mid game, in case you find it's too hard or easy
- The combat is fun, but challenging

Cons



One hot summer day, a hungry fox was walking through a vineyard when he saw a bunch of ripe, juicy grapes hanging from a vine. The grapes looked delicious, and the fox's mouth watered. He wanted to eat them right away.

The fox jumped up to grab the grapes, but they were too high. He took a few steps back and leaped again, but he still couldn't reach them. He tried running and jumping, but no matter how hard he tried, the grapes were just out of his reach.

Tired and frustrated, the fox sat down and looked at the grapes.



Then, instead of admitting defeat, he sneered and said, "Those grapes are probably sour anyway. I wouldn't want them." With that, he turned his nose up and walked away.

This fable, told by Aesop, teaches an important lesson. Sometimes, when people can't get what they want, they pretend it wasn't important to them in the first place. This is called "sour grapes," a term used when someone acts like they don't care after failing at something. The story encourages facing reality and acknowledging that something is out of reach—it is about letting go and moving on. Afterall, there are plenty of other yummy things to eat that are within reach!

 He founded his own film company


 He produced and directed 'American Graffiti'

Daniel's Mythology Minute

Daniel is a big mythology aficionado, and his favorite god is Zeus, King of the Olympians.

Daniel has long been fascinated by Greek and Roman mythology, especially the epic tales of gods, monsters, and heroes that shaped ancient beliefs.

Zeus, the mighty ruler of Mount Olympus, stands out not just for his power, but for the dramatic story of his birth. Zeus was born to the Titan Cronus and his wife Rhea (aka the Mother Goddess). It had been prophesized that Cronus' children would overthrow him, so he swallowed each child at birth (*ick*)—but Rhea hid baby Zeus and tricked Cronus by giving him a rock in the shape of a baby to swallow (below).

Later, when Zeus grew up, he returned, forced Cronus to release his siblings, and led a rebellion known as the *Titanomachy*, which ended in the Olympian gods taking control of the cosmos (below right).



Daniel finds Zeus interesting because Zeus represents justice and authority, plus the power of nature, especially thunder and lightning, plus Zeus is the father of Hercules (Roman)/Heracles (Greek). Armed with a thunderbolt forged by the Cyclopes, Zeus became a symbol of divine power and leadership. Despite his flaws—like a fiery temper and many love affairs—Zeus held the universe in balance and punished those who broke sacred laws.

Daniel also enjoys how Zeus appears in Roman mythology as Jupiter (The Romans regarded Jupiter as the equivalent of the Greek Zeus), showing how cultures shared and adapted myths.
